ABRAHAMSON, Clarence Franklin

WWI

Clarence was born on September 25, 1896 in Yellow Medicine, Minnesota. He enlisted in the Army on March 15, 1916 and served in France with the Canadian Army Medical Corps, 226th Battalion, Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force. On August 15, 1929, Clarence married Viola Beaumont and they farmed in the Little Woody district in the R.M. of Swan River, Manitoba. They had one daughter who passed away at 18 months of age. Clarence was a member of Swan River Legion Branch 39 before he passed away on May 27, 1987. He is buried in the Fairdale Cemetery in the Big Woody district in the R.M. of Swan River.

ABREY, Ernest Lincoln

Ernest was born in England in 1889 and he married Lottie Cornford there. They immigrated to Canada in 1912 and in November 1916, Ernest joined the Royal Canadian Army, 118th Battery, CFF "B" Company, in Brandon, Manitoba. He served in France and Belgium with the 44th and 55th Battalions at Vimy Ridge and Passchendaele, was wounded three times and was discharged in February 1919. Ernest and his wife Lottie raised three sons and two daughters and farmed in the Dauphin area. He was a member of Dauphin Legion Branch 20 and he passed away in 1971. Ernest is buried in Dauphin's Riverside Cemetery.





ABREY, W. S.

W. S. Abrey enlisted in the Army and served as a Private during World War II.

ALLEN, Alfred

WWII

Alfred was born in 1925. He served with the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve on HMLS Algonquin at Dearwood. Alfred was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for fifty years before he passed away in 2005.

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ALLIN, Howard S.

WWII

Howard was born in Kenora, Ontario in 1905. He was with the local Militia and was commissioned at the outbreak of WWII, serving in Canada with the 17th Field Regiment. Howard was selected to represent Canada at the coronation of King George VI. Lieutenant Allin was killed in 1940 at Camp Petawawa, Ontario in a training accident.

ALLIN, Martin R.

Martin was born in 1917 in Kenora, Ontario. He joined the Army and served as a Sergeant with the 17th Field Regiment in Canada, England, Sicily, Italy and Northwest Europe during WWII. Martin was Past President of Kenora Legion Branch 12 and a member for forty-nine years. He passed away in 1989.

ALLIN, William B.

William was born in Kenora, Ontario in 1905. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Army and served as a Sergeant in Canada and England during World War II. William was a member of Kenora Legion Branch 12 for forty-three years before he passed away in 1984.


ALPWORTH, Alex G.

ANDERSON, Duane

WWII

WWII

Duane was born in 1924. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and served at Bournemouth, England during World War II. Duane was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for forty years before he passed away in 2008.

ANDERSON, Gordon A.

Gordon was born in 1923 in Gananoque, Ontario. He joined the Army in 1942 at the age of 19 and completed his basic and advanced training in Kingston, Peterborough and Owen Sound, Ontario. In early 1943, he arrived in England and was posted to the 2nd Infantry Division, 5th Canadian Infantry Brigade of the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers which landed in France on July 6, 1944. Their task was to continue up the coastline from France to northern Germany where they took the surrender of a German submarine and its crew. In Holland, he learned to be a Sergeant very quickly by diving into a foxhole before his Sergeant who was wounded and sent back to Canada. His unit was often under heavy fire resulting in several men being wounded and killed. In early May 1945, Gordon was promoted to Warrant Officer 2 and posted to the Army of occupation, returning to Canada in the spring of 1946 for his discharge. Gordon has been a member of Lundar Legion Branch 185 for more than ten years.

ANDERSON, Vernon J.

Vernon was born on May 27, 1923. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve during World War II and served in the North Atlantic. Vernon was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 prior to his death in 2009.

ANDERSON, William "Cecil"

Cecil was born on December 26, 1915. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1941 and after training in Trenton, Ontario, left Halifax in February 1942 for Liverpool, England. He trained on two-engine Manchester aircraft then transferred to the four-engine Lancaster bomber. The Royal Canadian Air Force was attached to the Royal Air Force and Cecil ended up in flight engineering school for six months in St. Athens, Wales. Royal Air Force 50 Squadron went on a bombing mission to Dusseldorf, Germany and twenty minutes prior to target, Cecil and six other crew members in the Lancaster were shot down at 1:00 am on June 12, 1943. After six weeks of running, Cecil became a civilian prisoner at Fresnes Prison outside Paris, then a POW in Stalag 1VB at Muhlberg, Germany until liberation in 1945. Cecil was a member of the elite Caterpillar Club (fliers who have successfully used a parachute to bail out of a disabled aircraft). He was a member of The Royal Canadian Legion for forty years before he passed away in 2010.

ANDREWS, William "Grant"

WWII

Grant was born in 1919 in Coulter, Manitoba. He joined the Canadian Artillery on March 21, 1941 and after his basic training, was stationed on Canada's west coast. He received his discharge for medical reasons. In 1986, Grant's health deteriorated and he entered a care facility in Reston, Manitoba in 2001. Grant was a member of Melita Legion Branch 127 for about fifty years before he passed away on June 4, 2003.

ARDAGH, Fred

Fred was born in Hartney, Manitoba in 1919. He joined the Army and served in Canada with the Manitoba Dragoons during World War II. Fred was a member of Hartney Legion Branch 26 for more than forty years before he passed away in 1986.





ARDAGH, George H.

George was born in Hartney, Manitoba in 1921. He joined the Army and served in the United Kingdom and France with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, 3rd Division, during World War II. He was a prisoner of war at Stalag A and B.

ARMSTRONG, George Perry Jr.

George was born in 1924 in Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force and served as bomb aimer with 142 Squadron in Canada, England and North Africa. Flight Sergeant Armstrong was 19 years old when he was killed in action over Turin, Italy on November 25, 1943. He is commemorated at the Florence War Cemetery in Italy.

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ARMSTRONG, George Perry



George was born in Carman, Manitoba in 1885. He graduated with a medical degree in 1911 and practiced for four years in Coronation, Alberta. He then joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force and in 1915, went to England where he transferred to the RMAC attached to the 15th Royal Scots, 34th Division as a Medical Officer. He served in the Battle of the Somme in 1916 where he was awarded the Military Cross, and he also served in Mesopotamia. George returned to Canada in 1919 and upon his discharge, located to Portage la Prairie where he went into medical partnership with Dr. Hassard. He was a member of Portage la Prairie Legion Branch 65 before he passed away in 1952. George is buried in Hillside Cemetery in Portage la Prairie.

ARNASON, Stefan "Steve"

Steve was born on November 7, 1918 in Cayer, Manitoba but the family lived to Moosehorn, Manitoba before moving to Harcourt St. James in Winnipeg. He worked for his uncles at Lundar during summer holidays. Steve joined the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers in 1942 and did his training in Canada. He went overseas in early March and served in Holland and Belgium. His unit didn't actually fight but mostly cleaned the destruction left by the war. Steve married Lara Bjornsson on his embarkation leave on February 15, 1945 and he returned home in October 1945. That year, the D.V.A. helped them buy a farm which they moved into in October 1946. They raised a family of seven children who enjoyed good careers. Steve worked for the Government of Canada as Record of Performance Inspector from 1970 to 1983. Steve was a member of Lundar Legion Branch 185 for thirty years before he passed away at home on March 16, 1989.

BAKER, Sam R.

Sam was born in Hartney, Manitoba in 1954. He enlisted in the Canadian Army and served during peacetime. Sam has been a member of Hartney Legion Branch 26 for over twenty-six years.

BARRÉ, Léonard Maurice

Léonard was born in 1915 in Belleview. He enlisted in the Army and served in Europe with the Royal Canadian Supply Corps. In Germany in 1945, his transport hit a mine and he died of his wounds on May 9. He is commemorated at Holten Canadian War Cemetery in Holland. Barré Lake, east of Fidler Lake, was named after him in 1995.



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BEADLE, Joseph "Bernard"

WWII

Bernard was born in Humbleton, England in 1918 and he joined the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps in Portage la Prairie, Manitoba on January 28, 1942. After his training in Canada, he served various missions in Italy, England, Sicily, France, Holland, Belgium and Germany. Lance Corporal Beadle was a driver/mechanic hauling mostly explosives and other supplies. He received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp, the France and Germany Star, the 1939-45 Star, the Italy Star and the Defence Medal. Bernard passed away in 1999 and had been a member of Swan River Legion Branch 39 for forty-seven years.

BELL, Edward Russell

Edward was born in Rosewood, Manitoba in 1915. He joined the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders at the age of 25 and served from 1940 to 1945 in Italy, at Dieppe, Normandy and in England as a sniper in the Second Division, Dark Blue Patch. Private Bell returned home after being wounded in action when a bullet tore through his knee. In 1952, he married Helen Kitkowski and they raised four children in Anola, Manitoba. Edward worked in construction, drove for Red Patch Taxi, was janitor for the Transcona School Division and RR#1 Dugald Mail Carrier from 1970 to 1987 when he retired. In 1947, Edward was credited for saving lives when he hooked up his truck and pulled passenger cars away from a burning train wreck. He was a member of Springfield Legion Branch 146 for about fifty years before he passed away in March 2003.

BELLAMY, Rose

Rose was born in 1921. She joined the Canadian Women's Army Corps and served in Canada, England and Germany during WWII. Rose was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for forty years before she died in 2007.

BENSON, Ivor "Ben"

WWII

Ben was born in 1917. He moved to La Rivière, Manitoba in 1932 and married Anne McDonald in 1942. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and went overseas in September 1943, serving as a Lancaster pilot. Flight Lieutenant Benson was reported missing and presumed dead in February 1945 while on a mission over the North Sea. There is a headstone for him in the Air Force Memorial at Runnymede, United Kingdom and there is also a lake in northern Manitoba named in his honour.

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BERNST, Ronald W.

WWII

Ronald was born in Nokomis, Saskatchewan in 1926 but the family moved to Port Arthur (Thunder Bay), Ontario in the early 1930s. He was the youngest of seven brothers who also served in the Navy and the Army during WWII as well as in Korea. Their father served in the Army in WWI and WWII. Ronald was 17 when he joined the Navy in 1943 and after basic training, was assigned to the Corvette, HMCS Shawinigan. He served as an able Seaman on convoy escorts from Halifax to England, Nova Scotia to Newfoundland conducting submarine patrols off the Canadian east coast. Ronald was killed on November 25, 1944 when a German U Boat torpedoed the Shawinigan off the coast of Newfoundland. There were no survivors out of the 91 crew members. Ronald was nineteen and a half years old.

BINTEIN, Camiel

Camiel was born in Hooghlede, Belgium in 1897. He immigrated to Goodlands, Manitoba with his father Emile in April 1912 and relocated to St. Boniface in 1913 to join his mother and two younger brothers. He enlisted on March 17, 1916 with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, also known as the Little Black Devils, and served with the 78th Battalion, and possibly with the 203rd Battalion as well. Camiel was killed in action on September 2, 1918 in Belgium, a few kilometers from where he was born. He had visited with his uncle, Alfons-Rene Bekaert, the night before he was killed.





BOATFIELD, John Henry

John was born in Lauder, MB in 1919. He joined the Army and was killed in action during World War II.

BODKIN, Alvin Graham

Alvin was born in Harriston, Ontario on June 26, 1909 but grew up in Napinka, Manitoba. After his school years, he went to Regina and worked at the Bank of Commerce before moving to Winnipeg. He married in 1934 then joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1942 and was stationed in Abbotsford, British Columbia where he suffered a fatal heart attack in 1944 due to high altitude in a training exercise. Alvin is buried in the Napinka Cemetery and Bodkin Lake in northern Manitoba was named after him.

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BOSS, Nicholas

WWII

Nicholas was born in 1921 in Sandy Lake, Manitoba. He joined the Army in Winnipeg at Fort Osborne Barracks where he took his training. He was sent to North Bay, Ontario then returned to Winnipeg where he worked at the Officers' Mess until the end of the war. Nicholas was a member of Eriksdale Legion Branch 140 for thirty-four years before he died in 1980.

BOUTET, Doreen Bertha Lenore

Doreen was born in Arnaud in 1925. She joined the Canadian Army in WWII and served with "A" Company, No. 2 Platoon, in Kitchener, Ontario and Winnipeg, Manitoba. Doreen died in 1997.

BREAKEY, Frank Keam "Pete"

Pete was born in 1918 in Toronto, Ontario. He enlisted in the Army during World War II and served in Canada and Northwest Europe with the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders. Pete was wounded three times during the war. He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal and the Bernard I Montgomery Shield for service in the field. Pete has been a member of Hartney Legion Branch 26 as well as a Past President.

BRENNAND, Gordon

PEACETIME

Gordon joined the Air Force as a Flight Cadet. After officer school, he was sent to Gimli for pilot training, received his wings in January 1952 and was commissioned as a Pilot Officer. Gordon went for gunnery training then to Chatham, New Brunswick to train on the F-86 Sabre Jet. He was then posted to 422 (F) Squadron near Ottawa and from 1953, spent three years in Baden Soellingen, Germany at the home base for #4 (F) Wing. He returned to Canada to become an instructor on the T-33, a jet training aircraft. He was posted in Saskatoon, Winnipeg, Goose Bay, Toronto and Barrington, Nova Scotia after which he went to Staff College in Toronto and was posted in Portage, Ottawa and Winnipeg. Gordon's last posting was in Air Command HQ. He logged 6,000 hours in 22 aircraft types and retired as a Colonel with 35 years of service with the Canadian Forces and NATO. Gordon has been a member of Elkhorn Legion Branch 58.







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BROOMFIELD, Elmer G.

WWII

Elmer was born in Roblin, Manitoba in 1914. He joined the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve and served at HMCS Chippawa in Winnipeg and on HMCS Prince Robert in Canada, Korea and in the Pacific from 1941 to 1945. Elmer was a member of Atikokan Legion Branch 145 for more than forty years before he died in 1996.

BROWN, Marvin Edward

Marvin was born in Elbow, Saskatchewan on February 13, 1917. He joined the Canadian Scottish Regiment as a Private and served in England and France, landing on Juno Beach on D-Day, June 6, 1944. In August 1944, Marvin was wounded in the shoulder when struck by a bullet fired from a machine gun mounted on a German tank during the battle of Falaise Gap in France. In May 1945, he returned home and purchased a 320-acre farm in the Dugald area. On October 17, 1946, Marvin married Edith Winther and they raised two daughters and a son. He enjoyed a life-long career on the family farm raising a fine herd of Holstein dairy cattle. Marvin passed away on September 8, 1987.

BROWN, William

William was born in 1916 in Saltcoats, Scotland. He enlisted in the Canadian Forestry Corps during World War II and served in Canada, Scotland and Northwest Europe. He was a member of Kenora Legion Branch 12 for sixty-four years and spent several years on the Legion's Branch Executive. He was also a Master of the Masonic Lodge before he passed away in 2010.

BRUNSDON, Egerton



Egerton was born in 1885 in Hartney, Manitoba. He joined the Canadian Army and served with the 11th Reserve, 78th Battalion, in Europe during WWI. He fought at Mons and Arras and was wounded in the Battle of Cambrai. Egerton passed away in 1959.



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BUGG, Arthur John Richard "Art"

WWII

Art was born on October 3, 1919 in Lauder, Manitoba and his family moved to Napinka in 1928. He enlisted with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in Winnipeg in April 1940 and was based in England for 39 months, much of that time spent at Bordon Camp in Hampshire, west of London. He transferred to the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps in February 1943 and served as a driver. In October of that year, his unit was engaged in Sicily before making its way through Italy and then on to the Netherlands in February 1945. Art was discharged in October 1945 and a year later, married Lois Gertrude Bodkin with whom he farmed in Napinka until retiring to Melita, Manitoba in 1979. He was an active member of Napinka Legion Branch 89 for fifty-eight years before passing away at his home in Melita on October 27, 2004.

BULL, Lew

WWI

Lew joined the Canadian Army during World War I and served in England with the 222nd Battalion.





BURCZYNSKI, Piotr

Piotr was born on October 22, 1920 in Cryzykow, Poland. In 1940, his family was deported to the Soviet Union and in 1942, Piotr joined the Polish Army under General Wladyslaw Sikorski. He was deployed to Iran, Iraq, Palestine and Egypt where the 2nd Polish Corps was formed and joined the British 8th Army for the invasion of Italy. He fought in the horrific battle of Monte Cassino and was also at Ancona and Bologna. Piotr received the Star of War 1935-1945 Medal, the Italy Star and the Cross of Monte Cassino. In 1946, he came to Canada where in 1950, he met and married Helena. They were married for 60 years and had two children and two grandchildren. Piotr was a member of the Polish Combatants Association #13 and Andrew Mynarski VC RC #34. He was also a founding member of Polish Legion Branch 246 for more than forty-two years.

BURNETT, Henry Alexander "Sandy"

Sandy was born in 1898 in Ivanhoe, Ontario but he was living on his father's farm near Rosebank, Manitoba at the beginning of World War I. He joined the Army with his brother Richard and fought at the Somme as well as at Vimy Ridge. Sandy was with the 1st C. M. Rifles in France and Belgium. On April 9, 1917, he suffered almost a direct hit from a shell and was killed instantly.













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BURNETT, Richard Wesley "Dick"

WWI

Dick was born in 1888 in Ivanhoe, Ontario and was with the 1st C. M. Rifles in France and Belgium. He joined the Army with his younger brother Sandy and fought at the Somme, Arras and Vimy where Sandy was killed. Dick was wounded very badly and spent two days in a shell hole until he was rescued. He subsequently lost his leg at the hip after many operations to remove shrapnel. Dick became postmaster in Sperling, Manitoba and served there for thirty-six years. Richard passed away in 1959.

BUTCHART, Russell C.

Russell joined the Canadian Army in World War I and served with the 27th Battalion before transferring to the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps. Russell served at St. Éloi in France as well as at Ypres and Ashford.

BUTLER, James E.

James was born in Oakville, Manitoba in 1928. He joined the Army during World War II and served in Canada and Germany with the Royal Canadian Engineers. James was awarded the Canadian Forces Decoration and the NATO Medal. He has been a member of Erickson Legion Branch 143.

CARTER, Gordon

Gordon was born in 1920 in the Rural Municipality of Glenwood. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force during World War II and served in England with 428 Squadron at Bomber Command. Flying Officer Carter was a POW in Germany from May 1943 to May 1945. Gordon was a member of Hartney Legion Branch 26 for more than forty years as well as a Past President.

W. F. Carter was born in Liverpool, England. He joined the Canadian Army during WWI and went overseas to England on the Valacia and returned on the Lapland. Sergeant Carter served with the Canadian Railway Troops and CAMC, MD #10.

Harold was born in Hartney, Manitoba in 1922. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in World War II and served in Canada with the Wireless Electric Mechanic Division.




CATELLIER, Jean C.

Jean was born in Sudbury, Ontario in 1942. He became a member of the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada in the 1960s, serving in Canada and Cyprus. On his first tour of Cyprus, he was an ice truck driver, hauling ice to the outposts. On his second tour of the island, he was a member of the RECCE group. He now resides in Dufrost, Manitoba and has been a member of Morris Legion Branch 111 for more than thirty-three years.



John was born in 1891 in Pilot Mound, Manitoba. He enlisted in the Canadian Army on April 1, 1918 and served with 1st Depot Battalion. John passed away in 1963.

CHAMBERS, William J.

William was born in 1915 in Maryfield, Saskatchewan. He joined the Army in World War II and served with the Royal Canadian Rifles in Holland and Germany. William was a member of Atikokan Legion Branch 145 for fifty-six years before he died in 2010.

CHERCOE, Ronald L.

SPECIAL DUTY AREA

Ronald was born in 1939 in Tyndall, Manitoba. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1958 and following pilot training, was posted overseas to 427 and 430 Fighter Squadrons, flying F-86 Sabre aircraft. He was back in Canada in 1963 to instruct on Harvards and Tutors at 2 CFFTS in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. In 1966, he was posted to the CF-104 Starfighter Program. Following OTU at Cold Lake, Alberta, he was posted to 441 Recce Squadron at Lahr, Germany and on his return to Canada in 1970 for Staff School, he was posted to the Directorate of Flight Safety in Ottawa. His next posting was in 1973 to 435 Transport Squadron in Edmonton which he left in 1977 to instruct at the Instrument Check Pilot School in Winnipeg. In 1980, he was promoted to Major and posted to Air Command Headquarters. Later in 1980, he retired from the Forces to pursue a career with Transport Canada. Ronald has been a member of Stonewall Legion Branch 52 for more than twelve years.





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

CHUBEY, Michael

WWII

Michael was born in 1917 in Carlowrie. He joined the Army and served in Canada with the Royal Canadian Engineers during WWII. Michael was awarded the War Medal 1939-45 and he died in 1973.

CHUBEY, William



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
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CRAM, Lloyd

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

Posted to England in August 1942, he was assigned to the RAF Operational Training Unit at Bicester. He flew Blenheim IV light bombers in low-level raids over Northern Europe. Assigned to 18 Squadron in 1943, they were supplied the new Douglas Boston III and posted to Foggia, Italy via North Africa. On February 7, 1944, Scotty and his crew flew on a raid over roads near Rome. On their way back to base, they were mistaken for an enemy aircraft and were shot down. His death was confirmed in January 1945. Scotty loved the outdoors and played hockey and baseball with the Pine Falls Rovers. His service was commemorated in the naming of Dean Creek near Park Lake in the Whiteshell Park.

DEAN, Raymond Felix "Ray"

Raymond was born in 1917 and grew up in Pine Falls. He joined the Army in 1940 and served with the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers, 2nd Armoured Brigade Army, spending 40 months of active duty at the fronts of North Africa, Sicily and the Italian peninsula. Later, with his unit, he took part in the D-Day invasion on June 6, 1944. Subsequently, his CO was killed in action and Ray found himself commander, leading infantry and tanks into a small town in Normandy, liberating it. Ray was awarded six medals and in 1946, received the Oak Leaf Emblem for distinguished service. After his death in 1982, three islands on Bird Lake in the Whiteshell Provincial

Park were named Dean Islands. In November 1982, a cousin, John Dean, scattered Ray's ashes over the islands from an airplane above the lake.

DECOSSE, Gregory G. J.

Gregory was born in 1982 in Swan Lake, Manitoba. He joined the Canadian Army in 2001 in Winnipeg, Manitoba and did his basic training in St. Jean, Quebec. Master Corporal Decosse has served in Canada and also did a tour in Afghanistan in 2008. He is currently serving with the 2nd Battalion of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry at CFB Shilo, Manitoba. Gregory has received the International Security Assistance Force Medal.

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


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FEDOROWICH, Nick

Welly was born in 1902. He joined the Royal Canadian Army and went overseas to England in 1940. In 1942, he went on to Italy where he served until 1943. It is not known where he served between 1943 and 1945, the year of his discharge. Welly passed away in 1986.





FINDLAY, Oscar W.

Oscar was born in 1911 in Shoal Lake, Manitoba and he worked at carpentry with his brother who was a veteran of the first war. In 1941, he joined the Army and was attached to Lord Strathcona's Horse. Trooper Findlay was then trained on tanks and shipped to England and Europe where he saw action during the Italian campaign and in northwest Europe and Germany. Discharged on January 18, 1946, Oscar returned to civilian life and became a beekeeper in Shoal Lake. He married Elizabeth Jean Reid in 1953 who had been employed by the Federal Government in Winnipeg. Oscar had been affected by his war experiences and he led a quiet life as a beekeeper and inspector for the Provincial Government. Oscar and Elizabeth enjoyed playing golf and taking trips throughout Canada and the USA. They had no children. Oscar was a member of Shoal Lake Legion Branch 72 for fifty years before he passed away on April 3, 1998.


FINLAY, Albert



Albert was born in Belfast, Ireland on May 29, 1898 and he immigrated to Canada with his younger sister and mother in 1915. He went to Winnipeg to enlist in the Canadian Field Artillery, 16th Brigade, after which he served in France, Belgium and Germany during WWI. After the war, he became a welder for the C.P.R., traveling many miles from coast to coast. After working for the railroad, Albert lived most of his professional life in Mississauga, Ontario. He worked for Frigidaire Appliances and General Motors doing fine welding and his last employment was at the new Woodbine Race Track where he constructed some of the towers. James was born in 1882 in Morden, Manitoba and he served as a Captain in the South African Campaign and in the Boer War. He was awarded the South Africa Medal with five Bars (1901, 1902, Transvaal, Orange Free State, Cape Colony) and the South Africa Medal with two bars (South Africa 1901, South Africa 1902). James later enlisted in the 1st Canadian Mounted Rifles, Saskatchewan Regiment, and served in World War I where he was killed in action at the age of 34 on October 15, 1916. Captain Forster is buried in St. Sever Cemetery in Rouen, France. He received the War Medal 1939-45, the Victory Medal 1914-18 and the Memorial Medal. James was survived by his wife and three children.



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FORSTER, James Herbert "Jim"

Jim was born in 1913 in the Regional Municipality of Glenwood. In July 1938, he stowed away on a ship going to England as he wanted to join a Royal Tank Regiment. Within a few hours of landing, he had signed up with the British Army's 3rd Royal Tank Regiment. He served at Dunkirk, France, Austria and Germany and was a prisoner of war for approximately four years at various POW camps across Europe. Jim was killed in action in 1945 at Leau, Germany around April 12, 1945, having gone into battle assisting American forces with whom he had made contact after liberation. Trooper Forster died at age 32 and is buried in the Holten Canadian War Cemetery in The Netherlands. While in England, Jim had married Eileen, therefore, his medals and belongings were sent to her.

Russell was born in 1923 in Wakopa, Manitoba. He served with the 4th Division in

France, Belgium, Holland and Germany during World War II.

Stewart was born in Regent, Manitoba in 1922. He joined the Army in World War II and served as Staff Sergeant at No. 8 C.A.C. (A) Training Centre then transferred to Tank Gunnery.

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
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
FRY, Howard Vernon

Patrick was born in Northern Ireland in 1922. During World War II, he served as a Private with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in England and Italy where he was killed in 1943 by machine-gun fire at the Battle of the Moro River.

Ted was born in Alberta on February 3, 1924. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1942 and after completing training as a navigator, was posted to England where he flew in Halifax bombers with 426 Thunderbird Squadron, operating from Linton-on-Ouse in Yorkshire. On one notable flight, his aircraft was extensively damaged by anti-aircraft fire and an ensuing fire separated one engine from the aircraft. Fortunately, they were able to crash land without fatalities at an emergency field in England. Following the war, he continued his career with the Air Force specializing in radio, radar and communications. Sergeant Gaffray spent several years in Germany, Montreal and finally in Ottawa prior to his retirement. He passed away on May 10, 1986.

GALBRAITH, Elmer Franklin



Robert was born in Cornwall, Ontario. During World War I, he enlisted in the 222nd Battery in 1916 then transferred to the 44th Battery, M.G.S., and served in Northern France. He was killed in action in 1917 at Vimy Ridge.

Chriss joined the 45th Battalion during World War I and was drafted into the 78th Battalion, then the 24th Battalion, M. G. Section. He fought at Lens and Fresnoy where he was wounded in 1917. Chriss was hospitalized in Orpington.

Omer was born in Great Falls, Manitoba in 1924. In February 1942, he took the welding and machine shop training course and moved to Vancouver in July. Later in August, he enlisted into the 1st Hussar Tank Regiment and was posted to Camp Borden, Ontario where he qualified for his driver's certificate. After embarkation for England, Trooper Gauthier was killed in action in France on July 26, 1944 at the age of 20. He is commemorated at Bretteville-sur-Laize Canadian War Cemetery in Calvados, France. Gauthier Bay in Pope Lake was named after him in 1995.

GEDDES, Murray J.

WWII

Murray was born in 1923 in Pilot Mound, Manitoba. He was a flight instructor at Brandon, Souris and Gimli in Manitoba, then at Centralia in Ontario. After the war, Murray re-enlisted with the Air Force and served from 1951 to 1970. He served in Ottawa in Recruiting and Intelligence and was also a test pilot at Trenton, Ontario and Colorado Springs. Murray was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, the War Medal 1939-45 and the Canadian Forces Decoration with Clasp.

GÉLINAS, Gilbert H.

KOREA

Gilbert was born in Lawrence, Manitoba on September 27, 1928. He joined the Canadian Army and served in Korea with the Royal 22nd Regiment. He was wounded on the front lines and spent two months in a Canadian Forces hospital before returning to Winnipeg, Manitoba. He is now retired and has been a member of Charleswood Legion Branch 100 in Winnipeg.

GEORGE, Thomas Rowland "Rollie"

Rollie was born on October 22, 1893 in Springfield, Manitoba. He enlisted with the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force in April 1916 and served in the Lord Strathcona's Horse Cavalry on many battle fronts in France and Belgium. Although wounded in action in December 1917, Sergeant George was able to return to the battle front on recovering. Rollie received medals for gallant actions in battle. He was discharged in June 1919 and returned to Springfield where he married his local sweetheart, Edith Speer. They took ownership of the George family farm where they stayed until he retired at age seventy. Rollie was active in his community and had a keen interest in politics; however, he reluctantly passed up the opportunity to run federally for the Conservative Party. He died in 1983.





GIBSON, John Alexander

John was born on February 4, 1898 in Rosebank, Manitoba. He lied about his age in order to enlist in the Canadian Expeditionary Force on March 1, 1916. He served in the 222nd Overseas Battalion and arrived in England on the SS Olympia on November 20, 1916. John fought at Passchendaele and Vimy but after the war, he never wanted to speak of the trenches of death. He died in Morden, Manitoba on August 4, 1970, twenty miles from Rosebank.

GILBEY, John Percy

John was born in 1893 in London, England. In 1915, he enlisted with the Royal Canadian Army and served overseas with the 44th Battalion. He served in the European War, France and Belgium and was wounded before being honourably discharged in 1918. John was a member of Elmwood Legion Branch 9 and passed away in 1969.

GOHN, Myrtle R.

Myrtle was born in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan on April 27, 1914. In 1941, she was cooking at the White Pine Inn in Fort Frances using a wood stove to cook for 40 or 50 sawmill and pulp mill employees. She had to cut the meat from the carcass and bake her own bread. Putting up lunches for these workers earned her the princely sum of \$30. per month. In March 1942, she enlisted with the Women's Division of the RCAF in Winnipeg. After completing a chef's course in Guelph, Ontario, she was posted to a Bombing and Gunnery station at Paulson, Manitoba where she was assigned to the Officers Mess. She also served at the flying school in Dauphin, Manitoba, the No. 6 Wireless School in Winnipeg and at the Winnipeg Airport. On July 23, she married Lloyd M. Wheatley after his return from serving with RCAF overseas. Myrtle was discharged from the RCAF on October 3, 1945 and passed away in 2004.

GOLD, David S.

David was born in 1918 in Swan River, Manitoba and moved with his family to Pine Falls in July 1926 where his father was involved in the construction of the paper mill. David first enlisted with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in Winnipeg but later transferred to the Royal Winnipeg Rifles. Following D-Day on June 6, 1944, Rifleman Gold was killed in action at the age of 26 on June 8 in the "Kurt Meyer" infamy. He is commemorated at the Bény-sur-Mer Canadian War Cemetery in Calvados, France. David was one of five sons who served in the Armed Services during World War II. Gold Island in Stevens Lake was named after him in 1989.

GOLD, Ernest W.

Ernest was born in Pine Falls, Manitoba in 1924. He joined the Royal Winnipeg Rifles during World War II and served in Canada, England and Europe as a Rifleman. He was killed in action on February 16, 1945 at the age of 21 and is commemorated at the Groesbeek Canadian War Cemetery in Holland. He was survived by his wife of four months, Mary Gold (nee Waldron) of Shropshire, England and their unborn son. After the war, she and her son moved to Pine Falls to live with her in-laws. She later married Rifleman Gold's older brother, George. Gold Point in Stevens Lake was named after Ernest W. Gold in 1989.

GOWER, Orval E.

Orval was born in 1926 in Mowbray, Manitoba. He joined the Army and served in Canada with the 2nd Pacific Infantry Training Battalion during World War II.

Irvine was born in 1891 in Hartney, Manitoba. He joined the British Imperial Army during World War I and served in Serbia, Albania and Salonica with 605 Motor Transport Company. He was part of the Army of Occupation of Constantinople until April 1919. Irvine passed away in 1965.

GRANDIER, Donald

Donald was born in 1923. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force and served in Canada and in the United Kingdom during World War II. Donald was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for fifty years before he passed away in 2005.

GRAVES, George W.

George was born in 1918 in Clearwater, Manitoba. Because of the depression, George worked as a farm labourer for, as he put it, "room and board, smokes and enough money to go to a dance once a month." George was harvesting in Saskatchewan when war was declared and when harvest was over, he joined the Army in Saskatoon in October 1939. He was overseas in England by Christmas of that year. George served with the Saskatoon Light Infantry and the Cameron Highlanders of Ottawa in Sicily, Italy and Northwest Europe. He volunteered to serve in the Occupation Army and did not come home until September 1946. George, who lived and worked in Winnipeg and raised a family there, died in 1995. His brother Raymond was killed in action in Holland.

GRAVES, Raymond Wesley

WWII

Raymond was born in Clearwater, Manitoba in 1920 and was a farm labourer for a few years before he joined the Army in October 1940. After going to England, he was posted to the Regina Rifle Regiment and landed with the second wave of assault troops in "C" Company on D-Day. Raymond fought with the Regina Rifles until the battle of the Abbey Ardenne where he was wounded by mortar fire. "C" Company was totally wiped out in this battle. He could have gone home to Canada to recover from his wounds but chose to stay and rejoined his unit after he recovered. Raymond was killed in 1944 in another fierce battle, the assault on the Leopold Canal. He is buried in Adegem Canadian War Cemetery in Belgium. His brother George also served overseas in WWII.





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GREER, Bill E.

Bill was born in 1921. He joined the Canadian Army and served in the United Kingdom and Europe with LSR Motor in World War II. Bill was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for twenty-three years before he passed away in 2003.

GRIBBEN, Thomas

Thomas joined the Army and served in Europe, Malaysia and Singapore with the Seaforth Highlanders. He has been a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for thirty-one years.

GRIDLEY, Ernest Edward



Albert was born in Lauder, Manitoba in 1923. He joined the Royal Canadian Army and served during World War II.





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
GRIEVE, Alfred H.


GUNDERSON, Roald Benjamin

He was killed in action on June 11, 1944 at the age of 34 and was interned in the Bayeux Memorial in Calvados, France. Harry is commemorated on page 325 of the Second World War Book of Remembrance. Haider Lake, west of Nueltin Lake, was named after him in 1972.

HALE, Gerald J.

Gerald joined the Canadian Army and served during World War I. He fought at Vimy, Lachelette, Hill 70, Thielus Wood, Arras, Canal du Nord, Cambrai and Valenciennes. Gerald was also wounded and gassed at Passchendaele and he entered Mons on Armistice Day.

HAMILTON, Adam

Adam was born on April 3, 1897. He joined the Canadian Army during World War I and served as a Private in Europe. He was killed in action on September 2, 1918 in Pas de Calais, France.

HAMLIN, Anthony

Anthony was born in 1920 in Winnipeg, Manitoba and he served in Canada and England with the Winnipeg Grenadiers during WWII. At 20 years of age and as a recent business school graduate, Anthony was sent to the Recruiting Office to work administration and payroll. He left Winnipeg for Neys Camp 100, a German POW camp in northern Ontario where high profile Nazis were held, including Ernst Hanfstaengl, Hitler's pianist and confidante. He was excited to be sent into the real war, he thought, when he sailed on one of two U.S. warships to the Aleutian Islands only to be dropped off on a safe island with his Pay Officer. Their job was considered very important as the men needed to be paid. He also recalls D-Day where every available man was needed for the operation and their paperwork had to be in order before they could go. He describes this as a madhouse. Anthony never did see the front lines but his efficient service behind the scenes made life at least somewhat bearable for his comrades who did.

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


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HANSON, George

George was born in St. Thomas, North Dakota, USA in 1891 and the family moved to Dugald, Manitoba in 1902. He attended the University of Manitoba and was at Harvard on scholarship obtaining an M.A. in 1916 when WWI interrupted his studies. He returned to Winnipeg to enlist with the Royal Flying Corps. He won his wings in Toronto and after a brief gunnery course at Fort Worth, Texas, was posted to England where he served for a few months in the Royal Air Force as instructor-pilot. He attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and obtained a Ph.D. in Economic Geology in 1920. He joined the permanent staff of the Geological Survey of Canada in Ottawa and became Director from 1953 to 1956 when he retired. He was a competitive golfer, curler and marksman. George was married to Agnes Beattie Clemens and he passed away in 1967.

HANSON, Ingolf

Ingolf was born in 1889 in St. Thomas, North Dakota, USA. He was drafted under the Military Service Act and joined on January 16, 1918, serving with his brothers Swan and George. After WWI, he worked in the Canadian National Railway shops in Transcona, Manitoba doing architectural work until 1927. Then he went to San Diego, California and spent most of his time tuna fishing and gold mining. He was an entrepreneur who had his own boat and fished along the coast of California and South America. Ingolf was a bachelor when he died in California in 1966.

HANSON, Oscar

Oscar was born in St. Thomas, North Dakota, USA in 1884 and he moved to Dugald, Manitoba in 1902 with his family. He served in the Canadian Army in World War I. Oscar never married and he stayed on the family farm until 1947. He played a musical instrument in the music groups assembled for the community Friday night dances in Dugald, regularly played cribbage with neighbours and also had a share in a cabin at White Lake with the Percy family. Oscar played a part in starting the Springfield Curling Club, was the First President from 1946-47 and had purchased a pair of curling rocks to help start the casual curling three years earlier. He was also an excellent shot, winning many trophies, and was on the Bisley Team competing in Ottawa several times. Oscar passed away in 1955.

HANSON, Swan

WWI

Swan was born in St. Thomas, North Dakota, USA in 1887. He was called to serve in WWI, joining his brothers Ingolf and George, and enlisting in the #10 M.D., First Depot Battalion to serve in Canada with the Manitoba Regiment. Swan homesteaded in Saskatchewan from 1917 to 1920 and was drafted under the Military Service Act on June 5, 1918, serving until August 17 when he went on leave for the farm harvest. He then was struck off strength on December 29, 1918 and later farmed in the Dugald, Manitoba area. He served with many community groups, was Councillor for the RM of Springfield from 1921-24 as well as from 1935-1942. He was also Director of the Springfield Agricultural Society in the mid 1920s and the first John Deere equipment representative in the area. Swan was an entrepreneur who married Alice Thomsen and had two children. He died in 1952.





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HARDWICK, Walter A. "Bud"

Bud was born in 1924 in Lockport, Manitoba. He joined the Canadian Navy in May 1943 as an Ordinary Seaman at HMCS Chippawa in Winnipeg. He served in the North Atlantic on HMCS Naden, HMCS Protector, HMCS Avalon and HMCS New Westminster and was discharged as Able Seaman from HMCS Chippawa on October 18, 1945. He returned to Selkirk and began work with the Manitoba Rolling Mills. Wally was a member of Selkirk Legion Branch 42 for thirty years before he passed away in 2001.

HARDY, John

John was born in Scotland. He joined the 90th Battalion in 1915 then was drafted into the 8th Battalion. John served in England, France and Belgium and was killed in action in 1917 at Passchendaele.

HARKNESS, Roy E.

Roy was born in 1919 in Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. He did his Army training mostly in British Columbia and in 1943, took part in the Kiska Expedition. In June 1944, Roy went overseas as a Fusilier and into France as a replacement. From then on, he fought with the 2nd Division, with the Black Watch from Montreal, through France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was at Brammershaven in the North Sea on May 8, 1945 and very surprised to still be alive. He did occupation duty and also hauled supplies by truck from Calais to war-torn countries. Roy sailed for home in November on the Princess Elizabeth and returned to farming. In May 1946, he married his fiancée and together they raised five children. Roy retired to Brandon, Manitoba where he died in 2004.

Wilfred, son of Stanley and Winnifred Harrison of Emo, Ontario, joined the Canadian Army and served in the Lake Superior Regiment (Motor) during World War II. He was killed in action on September 12, 1944 and is buried in a cemetery in Belgium.

HAYNE, Robert J.

Robert was born in Killarney in 1918. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and served in Canada during World War II. Robert passed away in 2005.

William was born in 1916. He joined the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve and served in Canada and in the United Kingdom during WWII. William was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for fifty years before he died in 2006.

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
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HODGES, Lloyd

HUGHSON, Edward M.






KENNEDY, Donald

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


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KERR, Lorne MacLean

He had been working in the office of the Manitoba Paper Company in Pine Falls when he left that position to enlist into the Royal Canadian Air Force in Winnipeg. Fin was posted to Rivers, Manitoba where he trained at #34 Operational Training Unit, graduating as a navigator in the winter of 1942 then receiving his commission. Fin died on March 13, 1943 at the age of 21 when he and his crew went missing over the Bay of Fundy. Pilot Officer Lalor is commemorated at the Ottawa Memorial and Lalor Lake, which is northwest of Wekusko Lake, was named after him in 1973.

LANDERKIN, Clifford William

Clifford was born in the Rural Municipality of Louise in 1898. At age 20, he graduated from Normal School and was accepted at four schools for teaching positions, but instead enlisted as a Private II "Cadet for Pilot" on May 11, 1918. He trained as a pilot for seven months and was "discharged in consequence of being surplus to R.A.F. requirements." Clifford then became involved in a lifetime of business enterprises, community work and family commitments. He passed away in 1969.

Cameron was born in 1892 in the Lauder area. He joined the Army during World War I and served with the 54th Kootenay Battalion in Northern France. Cameron was killed in action at Vimy Ridge in 1917.

Vernon was a member of Arrow River Miniota Legion Branch for forty-four years before he passed away in 1990.



Ian was born in 1920. He joined the Royal Canadian Navy and served in the North Atlantic, the Mediterranean, the Caribbean, Northern Ireland, the Carolinas and New York City. He was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for fifty years





MacDONALD, Vernon Clair

Vernon was born in Portage la Prairie in 1918. He enlisted in the Canadian Army and transferred to the Royal Canadian Air Force. He spent the war years in Britain where he was involved in the development of radar, both operationally and as an instructor. He was commissioned in 1943. Vernon returned to Canada after the war with his British bride Margaret, a former W.A.A.F., and his young son. He spent six years in the Royal Canadian Air Force Reserve and overhauled the radar chains in Nova Scotia and Newfoundland during the Cold War. After flying 17 successful operational missions from 90 Squadron at Tuddenham, the crew was now flying Lancasters so they transferred to the Pathfinder Force and were posted to 7 Squadron at Oakington. On October 6 during their 23rd mission, their plane was hit near Essen, Germany. Word came that Walter was "missing in action" and much later, he was "presumed dead". The pilot of the plane met with his parents after the war and reported that Walter was seen to bail out and while the other crew members were taken as POWs, Walter was shot and killed by the Germans. He is buried at the War Cemetery in the Reichswald Forest.






McFAYDEN, Donald Alexander

In his message, he greeted his parents, told them to keep their chin up and said that he would write as soon as he could. He also referred to his bet with his father about who had won the Stanley Cup. Jack had been reported missing after operations over Germany on April 17. He passed away in 1996.

McKENZIE, James Wallace "Wally"


McKENZIE, Morris Allan

As a paratrooper in 1952, his parachute failed to open and he was injured. Soon after, he was sent to Korea as a radio operator. Jack was honourably discharged in 1954 and was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, the Peacekeeping Medal, the UN Service Medal and the Korea Medal. 

John stayed in Italy after the war to help organize and prepare the ships for the war brides' journey to Canada. Arriving home in 1947, he returned to work on the C.P.R. at Reeder, Kirkella and Miniota where he remained working until his retirement in 1969. John passed away in 1996.









McLENNAN, James S.

WWII

James was born in 1926 in the Rural Municipality of Shellmouth. He joined the Army during World War II and served in Canada with the Lord Strathcona Horse. He was awarded the Defence Medal and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal. James was a member of Gladstone Legion Branch 110 for fifty-three years before he passed away in 2008.

McLEOD, Alexander Grant

Grant was born in 1925 in Mather, Manitoba. He enlisted in the Navy in March 1943 and served on different ships in the North and South Atlantic, in the Mediterranean and in the Suez region. Stewart was born in 1926. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and served during World War II. Stewart was a member of Fort William Legion Branch 6 for nine years and he died in 2003.

McLEOD, Royden H.

WWII

Royden was born on November 12, 1924 in Mather, Manitoba. He helped on the family farm before enlisting in the Royal Canadian Air Force on his 18th birthday. He trained at Brendan, Vernon and Boundary Bay, British Columbia from where he went directly overseas. Flying many different airplanes, he was posted to India where he flew with 356 Squadron of the Royal Air Force and later with the Southeast Asia Air Force, based at Christmas Island. His plane failed to return from dropping supplies to POW camps. Royden was 20 when he died on August 18, 1945 over the Indian Ocean, a week after the war was declared over. Royden McLeod Lake was named after him in 1995 and he is commemorated at the Singapore Memorial. He was posthumously awarded the Operational Wings of the RCAF in recognition of gallant services in action. Royden also received the Burma Star, the 1939-45 Star, the GRF Cross, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and the George VI Medal.

Clifford was born in Russell, Manitoba in 1921. He joined the Army and served as a Lance Corporal with the Provost Corps in Canada, England, Belgium and Holland during World War II. They finally got to the Canadian lines and strode into a company headquarters where they were welcomed and fed. Ronald then went to England and took more training as a pilot. After 1945, he studied and became a doctor but contracted MS after which he became a psychiatrist and worked in Louisiana and San Antonio. Ronald passed away in 1998 and his name is inscribed on a stone in Trenton, Ontario. He was a member of Grandview Legion Branch 14 and Gladstone Legion Branch 110.





McROBERTS, Paul R.

Paul joined the Canadian Army during World War I and served in France at Amiens with the Army Service Corps and the 16th Canadian Scottish.

MICHALOW, Joseph

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



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


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MITCHELL, Erle S.

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



Elmer Earl




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O'NEIL, Dennis P.

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


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OTTO, Frederick William "Fred"

Nestor was born in January 1923 in St. Phillips near Kamsack, Saskatchewan. He enlisted at the RCAF Recruiting Office in November 1942 and reported for military service in July 1943. Nestor took his basic and advanced training in Nova Scotia, was placed in the Royal Canadian Artillery serving on anti-aircraft guns in Halifax, then placed in infantry and sent on the Mauritania to England for battle training then on to Northwest Europe. 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






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PHILLIPS, Ralph W.

Under heavy fire, they cleared 85 mines by sweeping and blowing them up. They were accompanied by the U.S. Augusta, HMS Monitor and several U.S. destroyers. The crew was told that they were embarking on a suicide mission, resulting in a potential loss of 85% of the crew. Miraculously, they all survived. Serving as a Stoker/Petty Officer until the end of the war, Nick then returned to Fort Frances where he married and raised his family of six. He spent 44 years as a stationary engineer in the pulp and paper mill in Fort Frances and was a member of Fort Frances Legion Branch 29 before he died on October 13, 1999.

POTT, Harold Wilfred Earl



He met Doris Treadwell in 1918 and they were married on April 29, 1919. Tom brought his new bride home to Woodmore where they settled on a farm near his parent's home. They have lived there ever since. Tom died in 1992.





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POWELL, Howie Jeffreys

Howie was born on February 19, 1888 in Souris, Manitoba and he excelled in sports and was an excellent horseman. By 1910, he was homesteading at Lancer, Saskatchewan and then Howie enlisted in the 1st Canadian Mounted Rifles in December 1914 in Brandon, Manitoba. He trained in Canada and served in England, France and Belgium. Howie sailed for England in June 1915 and arrived in France a few months later, in September. He was killed in action on May 13, 1916 in the trenches at Hogge, near Ypres. Howie is buried in the Menin Road South Military Cemetery in Belgium.

PURKESS, William J. T.

William was born in Pratt, Manitoba in 1920. He joined the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps and served in Canada during World War II. William was a member of Victoria Legion Branch 121 for forty-seven years before he passed away in 2006.

Curly returned to Canada on June 21, 1945. Flight Lieutenant Riach received the RCAF Operational Wings, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, and the 1939-45 Star. He was a Life member of Roseau Valley Legion Branch 160 for twenty-nine years. He died in 2009.

ROSE, Donald I.

Donald was born on April 19, 1923 in Gladstone, Manitoba and moved with his parents to Stony Mountain in 1924. He was working for MacDonald Brothers Aircraft in Winnipeg before he enlisted in February 1942 with the Royal Canadian Air Force and served with 434 Squadron during World War II. Donald was sent to the Initial Training School in Saskatoon then began training as an Air Bomber at the No. 8 Bombing and Gunnery School in Lethbridge. He went overseas to England and was posted at Staverton for a course beginning on May 19, 1943. Flight Sergeant Rose was killed in action on January 29, 1944 when his Halifax aircraft failed to return from a night raid over Berlin. He is commemorated at the Berlin 1939-1945 War Cemetery in Brandenburg, Germany and is buried in Hamburg, Germany. Rose Bay in Molson Lake was named after him in 1988.

ROSE, Thomas Herbert "Tom"

Tom was born on April 6, 1921 in Gladstone, Manitoba. Very active in sports and skilled at carving and model building, he was awarded first prize at a handicraft exhibition in 1937 at the T. Eaton Co. in Winnipeg when he submitted a model of the Queen Mary. When World War II began, his ambition was to join the Royal Canadian Air Force. He was first rejected because of an eye problem but when this was rectified, he was accepted in April 1940. He graduated as an air observer on October 25, 1940 and arrived in London on November 25 when he started serving with 40 Squadron. Tom was reported missing in action on his first operational flight over Berlin on December 22, 1940. Rose Point on Molson Lake was named after him in 1988.

ROSS, Floyd Reginald

Floyd was born on April 17, 1921 in Antler, Saskatchewan. He came to the Elgin district and worked on a farm west of Elgin for William J. Lucy. He is well remembered there as a young man who loved to play guitar and sing. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in May 1942 and married Joyce Farrough of Elgin that winter. They had one daughter, Brenda, who was born before he went overseas. Floyd served in Canada, Alaska and overseas and was part of 356 Squadron serving on a mission over Burma on June 12, 1945 when a violent tropical storm came up which drove their plane 100 miles off course and out of radio contact. He was flying a Liberator KH-316 with 356 Squadron. The plane crashed on a mountainside and all crew members were killed. Flight officer Ross was buried in a mass grave in Rangoon, Burma and was awarded the 1939-45 Star, the Burma Star, the Defence Medal, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Bar and the War Medal 1939-35. His name is on the Memorial Cenotaph in Elgin, Manitoba.



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ROSS, John David "Jack"

Jack and his twin sister Kathleen were born on the farm north of Elgin, Manitoba to George and Elizabeth Wallace on December 9, 1919. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in March 1941 and received his training at Brandon, Regina, Portage la Prairie and Macdonald before going overseas in August 1942 to serve with 423 Squadron. Flight Lieutenant Ross was killed in action on February 11, 1945 and is buried in Irvingstown, Ireland.

ROSS, Kenneth T.

Kenneth joined the Army and served with the 222nd Battalion then transferred to the 1st C.M.R. Lance Corporal Ross was killed in action at Vimy Ridge in Northern France in 1917.

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


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

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
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SELLEN, Richard F.

WWII

Richard was born in 1920 in Oak Bank, Manitoba. He joined the RCAF and flew Lancasters with 426 Squadron, Bomber Command, Linton-on-Ouse in York, England. He recalls April 20, 1944 on a bombing run in Koln when they were hit by eight incendiary bombs from one of their own planes, setting fire to their starboard engine and the port wing, knocking out the trim tabs and making a hole through the wing and the big gas tank. A JU 88 fighter then attacked them while they were on fire but Richard took evasive action and lost the fighter. They finished the bombing run and headed for the emergency aerodrome on England's foggy coast. Richard did an instrument landing right on beam with two engines on one side, no trim tabs and one engine cut on the port side. He was to be awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross but asked that it be given to his bomb aimer as he had lost a brother on a raid a week earlier. Richard has been a member of Springfield Legion Branch 146.

SHARPE, Edward Gerald "Eddy"

PEACETIME

Eddy was born in Pine Falls, Manitoba in 1948 but left in 1954 when his father took employment at a paper mill in the USA. He was eighteen when he enlisted into the Marines as a Canadian citizen and was later posted to Vietnam. Private First Class Sharpe, after serving in Quang Nam Province, was killed in action in 1967, five days before his nineteenth birthday. He is interned in Calhoun, Tennessee. Eddy's awards were many, including the Purple Heart, the National Defence Medal and the Vietnamese Service and Campaign Medals. He was also posthumously awarded the Gallantry Cross with Palm and the Military Merit Medal from the Republic of Vietnam. Members of the Sharpe family have erected a plaque on a concrete cairn in his memory and it sits at the foot of Manitou Rapids in Pine Falls, at the extreme end of a point of land called Sharpe's Point.





SHEFFIELD, John Sidney

John was born on July 18, 1919 in Waskada, Manitoba and he farmed in the Pembina Valley following his father's death in 1943. He enlisted in the Canadian Army in March 1941, did his basic training then entered the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps on October 9, 1941. He was sent to England in 1942 and served in France and Holland from 1944-45. After the cessation of hostilities, he returned to England where he married in November 1945 and returned to Canada a month later for his discharge on February 7, 1946. His wife immigrated to Canada in June 1946 and they resided in Swan Lake where he became the owner of Swan Lake Garage. John was a member of Swan Lake Legion Branch 126 before he died of cancer in 1974 at the age of 55. He was the recipient of the 1939-45 Star, the France and Germany Star, the Defence Medal, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and the War Medal 1939-45.

Lou was born in Miami, Manitoba in 1914. He joined the Army in 1940 and served with the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals during World War II. After serving in Italy and Holland, Sergeant Simpson was discharged in 1946. 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
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SINGER, A. P. F. "Archie"

Howard was born on August 3, 1920 on a farm southeast of Elgin, Manitoba. He finished Grade 11 in June 1938 and completed a three-year course in Electrical Engineering. On leaving school, he took a short course in agriculture where he studied crop management, stock judging, and did some woodworking. Howard enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force in September 1941 and served in Canada and overseas with 624 Squadron. Killed in action on June 24, 1944, Flight Officer Sneath is buried in the Mazarques Cemetery Extension in Marseilles, France. Sneath Lake is named in his honour.

SPRATT, J. George

WWI

George was born in Elgin, Manitoba in 1894. He was 21 when he enlisted on November 29, 1915 with the Canadian Infantry, Saskatchewan Regiment. He also served with the 79th Battalion which was absorbed by the 1st Canadian Mounted Rifles. George embarked on the "T.S. Lampland" on April 27 and arrived in England on May 4, 1916. In September 1918, the objective of the Western Front was to break through the Hindenburg Line employing the entire front, from the Meuse to the English Channel, attacking at different points. The Canadian Forces, which were 98,790-men strong, were to advance toward Cambrai. On September 27, the troops crossed a dry bed at Canal-du-Nord and entered into Bourlon Village. In the next four days, the troops met with many setbacks and suffered many losses, including 13, 672 men lost. Private Spratt was killed on September 29, 1918 at the Battle of Bourlon Woods and is buried in Railencourt Communal Cemetery Extension I.B. 12 in France.



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STEEVES, John H. "Jack"

Jack was born in Kenora, Ontario in 1925. He joined the Seaforth Highlanders, 1st Division, and served in Canada, England, Italy and Northwest Europe. Jack was the local Chairman of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers for many years and he was a member of Kenora Legion Branch 12 for more than fifty-five years.

STEPHENS, Frank James

Frank was born in 1902 in Bristol, England. He joined the Royal Canadian Army during World War II and served in Canada, Europe, North Africa, in the Pacific, Burma, Italy, France and Germany with 71/113 Battery, 8th Field Regiment, of the Royal Canadian Artillery. Staff Sergeant Stephens had also received orders to escort POWs to Canada. He was awarded the War Medal 1939-45, the Atlantic Star, the Europe Star, the Africa Star, the Pacific Star, the Burma Star, the Italy Star, and the France and Germany Star. Frank was a member of General Hugh Dyer Legion Branch 138 in Minnedosa and he passed away in 1974.

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
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STRATH, George


STRICKLAND, Henry




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TAYLOR, John

Stephen's tunic and hat are in the Commonwealth Air Museum at Brandon, Manitoba.

TIMMERMAN, Rene J.



He was sent overseas with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, serving as a Rifleman in Canada, England and Europe, where he was killed in action on December 2, 1945 at the age of 33. Joe is commemorated at the Holten Canadian War Cemetery in Holland. Tourand Island in Grandville Lake was named after him in 1995.

TREVITT, Frank W.

Frank joined the 222nd Battalion, which re-enforced the 44th M. G. Company, and fought at Vimy, Hill 70, Passchendaele and Amiens where he was wounded in August 1918. At the 11th Canadian General Hospital in Eastbourne, England, he was operated on for a hernia and this proved fatal. Frank is buried at Birmingham, England.

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

Flight Lieutenant Whetter and his crew were posted to the 425 Alouette Squadron in Tholthorpe, Yorkshire, and then selected to Pathfinder Force, Gransden Lodge England, flying a total of 60 OPS over Western Europe. Clint was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his skill, courage, and determination. Discharged in May 1945, he returned home, married Dorothy Keeler and began farming at Dand. Together, they raised a family of four and were stalwart members of the community. Clint practiced and promoted soil conservation throughout his farming career for which he was inducted into the Canadian Conservation Hall of Fame and the Manitoba Agriculture Hall of Fame. At 93, Clint continues to be a member of Hartney Legion Branch 26.

George was born in Long Sutton, England in 1883. He joined the Canadian Army and served with the 78th Battalion in Canada, England and France. Private Whitelam was awarded the British War Medal and the Victory Medal and was discharged on February 28, 1919. George passed away in 1951.

WHITFORD, James W.

James was born in London, England in 1922. Soon after the cessation of the London Blitz, he qualified as an AB AA3 in the Royal Navy and was drafted into the division of the Coastal Forces. Shortly after, he was installed as a member of the crew of HMML 143, a small ship equipped with torpedo tubes and other armaments. For the first year, duties were confined to protecting coastal convoys, rescuing downed aircraft crews and patrolling enemy coastlines. Later, the ship was equipped as a minesweeper. This duty would extend well into the months following war's end. Most memorable was the sweeping in advance of the American Task Force for its landing at Omaha Beach on D-Day. After the Invasion came the clearing of mines in French and Dutch territorial waters. James was awarded the 1939-45 Star, the Atlantic Star, the France and Germany Star, the War Medal and the NGS Medal with Minesweeping Clasp. James was a member of the Imperial Vets Legion # 844 for fifty-five years.





WILLIAMS, Evan

Evan joined the Army and served during World War I.

WILLIAMS, Gordon Ivan

Gordon was born in 1922 in Carberry, Manitoba. He joined the RCAF in 1942 and was sent overseas in 1943. He served as a Warrant Officer with the 97th Division (RAF) Squadron Pathfinder Force in England, France, Germany and Holland. On January 30, 1944, he and his crew flew their Lancaster bomber for a Berlin bombing and were on their homeward leg when they were intercepted by a Messerschmitt night fighter. Their cockpit was shot away and the pilot and bomb aimer Williams were hurled away from the rest of the wreckage. The fuselage crashed into a farm house just south of Amsterdam killing the farmer, his wife and four of their eight children as well as the five remaining crew. These five crew members remained in the ground for fifty-seven years while Pilot Hart and Evan Williams were buried by the Germans in Zwanenburg Cemetery. In 2001, the crash was excavated and the remains of the five crewmen were re-interred in the Zwanenburg Cemetery with Hart and Williams.





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
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WILLIAMS, William R.

WILLIAMSON, Lloyd Nesbitt

Lloyd was born in Grandview, Manitoba on June 16, 1904 and he passed away in the Souris Personal Care Home on January 30, 2001. He joined the Winnipeg Rifles on June 25, 1940 and was sent to Debert, New Brunswick with another soldier to clean the barracks before the rest of the men arrived. They both contracted scarlet fever and were sent back to the Winnipeg Hospital. Meantime, his platoon arrived in Debert and from there, was shipped overseas. Lloyd was always sorry he couldn't go with them and he was discharged in June 1942. He belonged to Dauphin Legion Branch 20 for forty-six years then Souris Legion Branch 60 where he was a member for six years.





WILLS, William G.

William was born in 1907 in Hartney, Manitoba. He joined the Railway Division of the Royal Canadian Engineers and served in England, France, Holland and Belgium. William died in 1965 and is buried in the Mountain View Cemetery in Thunder Bay, Ontario.



Andrew was born in Edinburgh, Scotland on October 12, 1896 and he joined the Royal Garrison Artillery on September 21, 1914. He was stationed at Scapa Flow Naval Base in northern Scotland where he spent much of his duty on an armed trawler searching for German U-Boats off the British coast. Although he was selected and prepared for duty in France on two occasions, Andrew was ultimately ordered to remain in Scapa Flow to continue his service. Andrew suffered a lifelong disability when his foot was crushed by an artillery gun in November 1914. He was discharged from the British army in February 1919 and moved to Canada in 1920, eventually settling with his family in the Plumas, Manitoba area, and later retiring in Neepawa. Andrew was a member of both the Plumas and Neepawa Legion Branches for a total of forty years before he passed away in 1983.

YAKE, Ernest R. "Ernie"

Ernie was born in Mather, Manitoba on December 25, 1921. He joined the Army in 1941 and served as a motor mechanic in Canada and England, repairing tanks with the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers during World War II. Ernie received the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp, the 1939-1945 Star and the Defence Medal. He was a member of St. Paul Legion Branch 100 for more than sixty years before he died on December 20, 2009.

He joined the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders on January 7, 1942 and served in Canada, England, Sicily, Italy and Holland, going overseas in July 1942. His jobs included unloading boats, policing towns, taking ranges and he was also a machine gunner as well as a Bren Gun Carrier driver. Bert also served with the Saskatoon Light Infantry, P.L.F., M.G.S. When in Italy, they were issued helmets that looked like German helmets and were fired upon by their own tanks using armour-piercing artillery. Thankfully, they weren't explosive shells. After VE-Day, Bert volunteered for the Pacific but hostilities had ceased by then. He received the 1939-1945 Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp, the Defence Medal and the War Medal 1939-45. Bert married Gladys Bamford and they raised nine children. He has been a member of Mather-Cartwright Legion Branch 86 for over sixty-five years.

YAKE, Murray H.

WWII

Murray was born in Mather, Manitoba on November 19, 1919. He joined the South Saskatchewan Regiment in April 1940 but broke his leg before his regiment was sent overseas. He then served as a paratrooper instructor in Canada, then as a truck driver and dispatch rider in England in 1944. He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp, the 1939-45 Star and the Defence Medal. Murray was a member of Lake Cowichan Legion Branch 210 for more than twenty years and he passed away on August 2, 1986.



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
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

He spent 18 months there and in 1941, was released and had to make his way to Persia to meet with the British where he signed up with the Polish Navy. This required traveling through Persia, Iraq, Jordan and Palestine to England where he was assigned to a ship. After the war, he married and settled in Edinburgh, Scotland. Teofil immigrated to Canada and arrived in Winnipeg in 1958. He joined The Royal Canadian Legion in 1968 and was one of the founding members of Polish Canadian Branch 246 where he held various positions, including President in 1975 and Vice-President in 1985. Teofil received the 1939-45 Star, the Atlantic Star, the Polska Swemu Obroncy, the France and Germany Star, the Defence Medal and the 60th Diamond Jubilee.

ZEGHERS, Arthur J.

Arthur was born in St. Alphonse, Manitoba in 1917. He served with the Vancouver Coastal Brigade, the Oxford Rifles and the Lincoln and Welland Regiment in Canada, Holland and Germany during WWII. Arthur's first posting was on a secret mission on Yorke Island, a deserted island off the west coast of Vancouver. This was to set up a base in the forest to scope out any invasion from the Japanese trying to enter from the west. He traveled there on the Princess Elaine. Arthur was a member of Holland Legion Branch 121 for sixty-four years before he passed away in 2008.





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

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
